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III. Actionable Items

A. District Strategic Plan: 2017-18

Colleen Dickmann, Superintendent and members of the Strategic Plan Committee, will be present to update the Educational Services Committee on the Wisconsin Rapids Public Schools' (WRPS) Strategic Plan (Attachment A). Progress toward goals, as well as next steps will be shared.

The administration recommends approval of the 2017-18 Wisconsin Rapids Public Schools' (WRPS) Strategic Plan.

B. Community Learning Center Grant

Mead Elementary Charter School is applying for renewal of the DPI 21st Century Community Learning Center grant for the 2017-18 school year. This grant funds the After-School Club Mead program that serves over 130 students each school day until 6:00 p.m. The program includes partnerships with the Boys and Girls Club, Mead School, and the YMCA. The grant will be used for staffing the program through a contract with the Boys and Girls Club, Learning Zone tutors, AmeriCorps contracts and enrichment teachers. The grant funds have increased this year with intent to fund a full-time Academic Partnership Coordinator who provides free preschool programs, monthly Family Activity Nights, volunteer coordination and data organization. The Academic Partnership Coordinator oversees and coordinates all programming including summer activities for parents and work with the AmeriCorps Members.

The administration recommends approval of the 21st Century Community Learning Center grant request for Mead Elementary Charter School in the amount of \$145,000.

C. United Way of Inner Wisconsin Grant for Before and After School Club Mead

Mead Elementary Charter School is requesting a \$61,500 grant from the United Way to fund the Before- and After-School Club Mead program. Club Mead is a partnership program with the Boys and Girls Club of Wisconsin Rapids and YMCA Kids Clubhouse. The grant funds will be used to provide Boys and Girls Club staffing, staffing for Enrichment classes, staffing for YMCA Kids Clubhouse, and compensation for an Academic Partnership Coordinator. Over 130 students in grades 4K – 5 participate in the Club Mead programs which take place every school day from 6:30 a.m. to 6:00 p.m.

The administration recommends approval of the United Way grant request for Mead Elementary Charter School in the amount of \$61,500.

D. K-12 Art Curriculum

The K-12 Art Department has been working for two years to map their curriculum for WRPS students in kindergarten through grade 12. The Art Department has worked hard to develop mission and vision statements, as well as curriculum maps that provide the best art education possible for our students. The proposed curriculum represents the Wisconsin Model Academic Standards for Art, and goes even further to include best practices, technology, and creative opportunities.

The WRPS Council for Instructional Improvement (CII) voted unanimously to support the proposed K-12 Art Curriculum (27-yes, 0-no).

Patricia Larsen, CII Art Sub-Committee Chair, along with all members of the WRPS Art Department will be present to share their updated curriculum with the Committee.

The administration recommends approval of the K-12 Art Curriculum for implementation beginning in 2017-18.

E. Elementary Reading and Language Arts Materials

During the 2015-16 school year the Board of Education approved the elementary English/Language Arts Curriculum. In addition the Board approved the purchase of the "Writing Units of Study" as the program that would be used to teach writing in our elementary schools.

The Elementary English/Language Arts CII Committee felt more time was required to pilot reading materials. That piloting took place this fall. Since that time, systemic discussions have taken place among teachers and administration about the reading programs that were piloted. From those discussions, four options were put forth for teachers to consider. After hearing input from all teachers, the Elementary

English/Language Arts Committee voted on the four options. The results of the vote were as follows:

- 1. Adopt the Reading Units of Study and Words Their Way in 2017-18 (2 votes)
- 2. Adopt the Journeys series in 2017-18 (4 votes)
- 3. Adopt the Reading Units of Study in 2018-19 and Words Their Way in 2017-18 (9 votes)
- 4. Delay the decision (0 votes)

Jen Wilhorn, Elementary Literacy Supervisor and Principal of Vesper Community Academy, along with members of the Elementary English/Language Arts CII Committee will be present to provide more detail for the committee on the fall reading pilots, staff input and the ELA committee's recommendation to adopt "Words Their Way" in the fall of 2017 and the "Reading Units of Study" and updated classroom libraries in the fall of 2018. Attachment B sets out the cost of this proposal.

The WRPS Council for Instructional Improvement (CII) voted to support the proposed Elementary Reading/Language Arts acquisition. (26-yes, 0-no, 1-unsure).

The administration recommends approval of the purchase of Words Their Way in the fall of 2017 and The Reading Units of Study with supporting classroom libraries in the fall of 2018 in the amount of \$213,012, to be funded by curriculum acquisition and referendum dollars.

IV. Updates

A. Youth Options and Course Options

As reported in the fall, there were no Youth Options requests for the 2016-17 school year.

There are seven students taking nine courses during semester two of the 2016-17 school year through the Course Options program. In addition, there are 24 students taking one health related course at Mid-State Technical College. Several of the students are enrolled in the CCHI program.

Currently there is discussion at the state level about consolidating course and youth options.

V. Consent Agenda Items
