Drop ins are welcome but you may need to wait for scheduled appointments to be completed.

Please keep in mind that we do not mail paper copies of progress reports. The six week progress report will be posted into the portfolio tab of Skyward Family Access during the afternoon of April 22nd.


SENIOR JOSTEN'S ORDERS - APRIL 15

SOLAR ECLIPSE

On Monday, April 8, a partial solar eclipse will be visible in Wisconsin Rapids. The eclipse will begin when the moon starts to block the sun at 12:52 p.m. The eclipse will slowly build until 2:05 p.m., when the moon will cover almost 85% of the sun. After reaching its maximum, the eclipse will gradually wane until the moon clears the face of the sun at 3:19 p.m.

Students at Lincoln will view the eclipse with their fifth period classes. After instructions about how to protect their vision, students will be given certified eclipse viewing glasses and will also have the chance to use several other methods to view the eclipse safely. Parents who do not want their child to participate should complete and return <u>this form</u> to the main office.

Lincoln High School staff and students will also host members of the community for an eclipse

viewing event at the South Wood County Recreation Center. Eclipse glasses and additional viewing methods will be available at this venue as well. Look for signs on 16th Street, south of Lincoln High School.

Eclipses are sensational and rare, and if the skies are clear on April 8th, we will have a memorable experience.



DROP OFF AND PICK UP

DIRECT ADMIT WISCONSIN

All in Wisconsin! Together the Universities of Wisconsin provide a place for all Wisconsin high school students to access a world-class public education. The Direct Admit Wisconsin program fundamentally changes how we achieve that goal, all with seamless admission in mind.

The Direct Admit Wisconsin program is launching in 2024 for the high school **graduating class of 2025**. Participating UW universities will proactively admit Wisconsin high school students, who have chosen to participate, based on their high school GPA, academic course work, and graduation from a participating Wisconsin high school. During the first year of the program, select Wisconsin high schools are participating. Lincoln High School is one of the pilot, partner schools.

Below are a few questions and answers from the Direct Admit Wisconsin website.

What are the eligibility requirements for students?

First, you must be enrolled in a participating school district and opt to participate in the program. Then, if you are on track to complete the credits required for admission – 4 units of English, 3 units of approved math, 3 units of social science, 3 units of natural science, and 4 additional academic units – you will receive an admission offer through Direct Admit Wisconsin.

When and how do students opt in for the Direct Admit Wisconsin program?

Students in the Class of 2025 at participating high schools will agree to participate during the 3rd trimester of their junior year. In the future, the choice to participate will become a part of the regular registration process for incoming junior students. <u>This will be completed through the Family Access portal in Skyward</u>. What is the deadline for students/families to opt in?

Students and families for the Class of 2025 must opt in by June 3, 2024.


Books collected in this drive will be provided to children free of charge a simple act that can be life changing for the many families who can't afford to purchase books.

Allergies and Asthma

With warmer weather, many people notice an increase in allergy symptoms (congestion, runny nose, coughing, sneezing, itchy eyes, etc.) and asthma flare-ups. If you notice these symptoms in your child and they have no history of seasonal allergies or asthma, we encourage you to discuss the symptoms with their doctor, so you can determine if medication (whether over the counter or prescription) is needed. Also, please be sure to keep an eye on your student's inhalers to be sure they are not expired and have enough puffs before an asthma attack occurs!

Sleep for well-being

Is your child getting enough sleep? A child's overall health, well-being, and ability to focus in school could be affected by inadequate sleep. If your child does not get enough sleep they could have a higher risk for many health problems such as poor mental health, obesity, injuries, or behavioral problems that can contribute to poor academic performance in school. We encourage parents to discuss any medical or sleep concerns with their child's physician.

• 6 out of 10 middle schoolers do not get enough sleep

• 7 out of 10 high schoolers do not get enough sleep How much sleep someone needs depends on their age. The <u>American Academy of Sleep Medicine</u> has made the following recommendations for children and adolescents:

Age Group	Recommended Hours of Sleep Per Day
6–12 years	9 to 12 hours per 24 hours
13–18 years	8 to 10 hours per 24 hours

<u>Required Immunizations for School:</u> *****5 months through 15 months: 2 DTP/DTaP/DT, 2 Polio, 2 Hep B, 2 Hib, 2 PCV

*****16 months through 23 months: 3 DTP/DTaP/DT, 2 Polio, 1 MMR, 2 Hep B, 3 Hib, 3 PCV

*****2 years through 4 years: 4 DTP/DTaP/DT, 3 Polio, 1 MMR, 1 Var, 3 Hep B, 3 Hib, 3 PCV

*****Kindergarten through grade 6:
4 DTP/DTaP/DT, 4 Polio, 2 MMR, 2 Var, 3 Hep B

*****Grade 7 through grade 12: 4 DTP/DTaP/DT, 1 Tdap 4 Polio, 2 MMR, 2 Var, 3 Hep B

If your child should <u>not receive immunizations for any reason</u>, please fill out the <u>waiver</u> found at the bottom of the record form signed by a parent or guardian, and return it to the school nurse.

If your child should not receive immunizations due to a medical concern, please discuss it with your child's physician.


