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 - I. Call to Order
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 - A. Community Learning Center Grant: Mead Elementary Charter School

Mead Elementary Charter School is applying for renewal of the DPI 21st Century Community Learning Center grant for the 2018-19 school year. This grant funds the After-School Club Mead program that serves over 130 students each school day until 6:00 p.m. The program includes partnerships with the Boys & Girls Club, Mead School, and the YMCA. The grant will be used for staffing the program through a contract with the Boys & Girls Club, Learning Zone tutors, AmeriCorps contracts and enrichment teachers. The grant will fund a full-time Academic Partnership Coordinator who provides free preschool programs, monthly Family Activity Nights, volunteer coordination and data organization. The Academic Partnership Coordinator oversees and coordinates all programming including summer activities for parents and works with the AmeriCorps Members.

The administration recommends approval of the 21st Century Community Learning Center grant request for Mead Elementary Charter School in the amount of \$145,000.

B. Supplemental Pay Plan for Professional Development

Attachment A sets out suggested changes to the Supplemental Pay Plan for Professional Development for the 2017-18 school year. The Supplemental Pay Plan is reviewed annually, and consideration is given to suggestions from the Quality Educator Committee (QEC).

The administration recommends approval of the suggested changes to the Supplemental Pay Plan for Professional Development for the 2017-18 school year.

C. Open Enrollment Space Determination Limits

Wisconsin Statute 118.51 (5)(a) provides that nonresident school boards shall determine the number of regular and special education spaces available within the school district at the January meeting of the school board. A nonresident school board may consider whether the special education or related services described in the child's IEP are available or whether there is space available to provide special education or related services. These may include class size limits, program limits, pupil/teacher ratios, or enrollment projections established by the school board.

Wisconsin Admin. Code PI 36.06 (5)(a) provides that the school board designate the number of regular education spaces by grade, and the number of special education spaces by program or services.

After consultation with Human Resources Director, Dr. Ryan Christianson, it was determined that there will not be any regular education open enrollment space limitations at any grade level.

Special education open enrollment space limitations, as set out in Attachment B, were determined as follows:

- 1. Current students for the 2017-18 school year were delineated by program and school level (elementary, middle, high school).
- 2. Current numbers of sections were used to determine class averages. Sections often corresponded to teachers.
- 3. Maximum section numbers were determined based on the Statewide Caseload Number Chart from DPI (See Appendix C).
- 4. Capacity was calculated by multiplying "Sections" times the "Max per section."
- 5. Projected totals for 2018-19 were estimated factoring in the increase in enrollment in each program based on transfers in to the district and initial referrals. For most programs, this projection was approximately 10%.
- 6. Spaces available were determined by subtracting "Capacity" minus the "Projected Total."

The administration recommends that WRPS does not designate any space limitations for regular education open enrollment students for the 2018-19 school year. It is recommended, for special education, to deny all applicants whose IEP needs place them in programs for Level 3 students with Intellectual Disabilities or Emotional Disabilities due to a projected lack of space. In addition, it is recommended that students whose needs can only be met at the Wood County Alternative School be denied open enrollment due to a projected lack of space.

D. Driver Education Contract

In the summer of 2017, Wisconsin Rapids Public Schools entered into a contract with *Preferred Driver Education* to provide optional Driver Education instruction to students at Lincoln High School during the school day. The contract was for the 2017-18 school year only. Renewal was to be based on how things went throughout the school year. A proposed contract for renewal for the 2018-19 school year is set out in Attachment D.

The administration recommends renewing the contract for optional Driver Education instruction to students at Lincoln High School for the 2018-19 school year.

E. Possible Action to Approve of a Resolution in Support of the Wisconsin Voucher Taxpayer Transparency Bill

Earlier in the year, legislation was introduced in the form of Assembly Bill 267 and Senate Bill 183 which would require Wisconsin tax bills to include the amount of local tax dollars that is being diverted to support voucher schools. According to the Wisconsin Association of School Boards (WASB), school districts across the state had to raise taxes by \$25 million in the 2016-17 school year to make up for voucher school tuition losses. The Wisconsin Legislative Fiscal Bureau expects that amount to increase to about \$37 million in 2017-18, and \$47 million in 2018-19. Passage of the proposed legislation would allow taxpayers to be aware of how much of their money is going to voucher schools. For WRPS, that amount is \$333,258 for 2017-18.

The Board has expressed interest in heightening advocacy efforts where possible. Adopting the proposed resolution is one way to advocate for public school funding by educating the public through their tax bills about the negative impact that voucher school funding has on local school budgets and taxpayers. Similar resolutions have been adopted by the school districts of Eau Claire, Holmen, Janesville, Stevens Point, Stoughton, and Wausau.

The Committee can decide whether they wish to recommend approval of the Resolution to support the Wisconsin Taxpayer Transparency Bill (Assembly Bill 267 and Senate Bill 183).

- IV. Updates
 - A. Community Learning Center Grant: Boys & Girls Club

The Boys & Girls Club of the Wisconsin Rapids Area will be applying for a second 21st Century Community Learning Center Grant. The grant allows the Club to provide after school academic enrichment to members that align with the Wisconsin Rapids Public School's school day curriculum. The Club provides other youth

development programming that supports academic success, good character and citizenship, and healthy lifestyles.

The grant supports each of the elementary schools on the east side of Wisconsin Rapids with the primary school being Howe Elementary. During the past five years the Club provided staff mentors to work with 15 children at four elementary schools (Howe, Grove, Washington and Woodside). Moving into the next grant cycle the Club will have mentors focus their work at Howe. This is due to the grant requirement that 51% of the population served by the grant needs to come from one primary school. All other programs and services will remain the same.

A third component of the grant includes a focus on family engagement which is a priority area for the Boys & Girls Club in 2018 and beyond. The Club looks forward to continuing to serve the youth in the Wisconsin Rapids Public School District.

B. Remedial Course Report

In accordance with Chapter 36.65 of the Wisconsin State Statutes, the UW System is required to determine the high schools with more than six (6) students who, based on their performance on placement tests in the preceding twelve months, are required to take remedial courses in English or mathematics. For the fall of 2016, the report shows one hundred thirty (130) students from Wisconsin Rapids Public Schools were enrolled as new freshmen in the UW System. Of those students, six or fewer were required to take remedial college English or math courses. Attachment F sets out the complete report.

Supplemental Pay Plan for Professional Development

Beginning with the 2016-17 2017-18 school year:

- I. Professional Staff will receive \$125 added to their salary rate per approved credit or DEU completed between July 1 and June 30 of a given school year, for up to six credits or DEUs or a maximum of \$750. Any professional development hours earned beyond the 7.5 required hours in a given school year may be compensated at the hourly professional development or curriculum rate, if sufficient funds are available. This applies only to professional development beyond the professional staff member's contracted school day.
 - A. District Courses and Workshops:

Professional Staff may sign up for a district workshop/course on-line in one of two ways: (1) Respond to the course/workshop e-mail announcement with Google Form; or (2) Use the WRPS Professional Development Calendar located on the District web site.

- Proof of completed hours or DEUs will be submitted to the Curriculum Department by workshop/course facilitators. No paperwork proving hour or DEU completion needs to be submitted to the Human Resources Department by professional staff taking courses/workshops.
- Proof of credits completed and final grades for district sponsored courses will be submitted to the Curriculum Department by the course facilitator.
- No more than eleven and one-half hours toward a DEU may be carried over from one school year to the next school year.
- There will be no carryover of DEUs or credits from one school year to the next.
- The number of DEUs and hours toward DEUs earned will be placed on the Employee Portal.
- B. Courses Not Sponsored by WRPS:

Professional Staff enrolling in credit courses not sponsored by the District must receive approval from Human Resources by submitting a "Approval Request Form" two weeks prior to the first class. The form is available at the WRPS web site.

• Professional staff must submit an official grade report or transcript showing completed credits to the Director of Human Resources no later than **July 15** of the year in which said compensation begins.

- There will be no carryover of credits from one school year to the next.
- C. Master's Degree:

Professional Staff will receive \$5,000 added to their salary for an approved Masters Degree program completed prior to **August 31** or **December 31**. Professional Staff will be compensated for only one Master's Degree.

- Professional Staff enrolling in a master's program must receive prior approval from Human Resources by completing the "Master's Degree Form." The form is available at the WRPS web site.
- Professional Staff enrolled in a Master's Degree program must submit a "Graduate Course Compensation Request Form" two weeks prior to the start of each class taken in the program.
- Professional Staff enrolled in a Master's Degree program must submit an official grade report or transcript showing completed credits to the Director of Human Resources no later than **July 15** of the year in which said compensation begins.
- Professional Staff enrolled in a Master's Degree program must submit an official transcript showing a completed Master's Degree to the Director of Human Resources no later than September 30 or January 31 of the year in which said compensation begins.
- If proof of masters completion is submitted on or before **January 31**, supplemental pay will be \$2,500 the first year and \$5,000 thereafter.
- II. Supplemental pay (with the exception of Master's Degree see I(C) above) will be added to salaries beginning with the first payroll of the school year, following the year in which the educational units are completed. Supplemental pay will be paid as a percentage of a professional staff member's full-time equivalency in a given year.
- III. Professional Staff with an annual full-time equivalency salary at or above \$70,000 may earn \$125 per approved credit and/or DEU. Beginning with credits/DEUs earned in 2013-14, tThis will be paid as a "one time only" stipend the following year in which the credit(s) or DEU(s) are completed.
- IV. This compensation plan is subject to review by the Board of Education.

Note 1: Students with disabilities where there is generally not a matching categorical program, such as TBI, Autism, OI, or OHI, may be tallied according to the type of services required. For instance, a child with autism requiring substantial curricular modifications and life skills could be tallied as Level 3 CD, while a student with OHI requiring only academic modifications and quiet work space may be tallied as Level 1 LD.

<u>Note 2</u>: When using this chart, it is important to consider extenuating circumstances, as this chart is not meant to imply absolute limits. Table 2 may be helpful in determining variables which may be significant to particular situations. The availability of paraprofessional staff does not increase the maximum caseload limit. However, access to paraprofessional staff time may assist in ameliorating an enrollment situation.

SCHOOL DISTRICT OF WISCONSIN RAPIDS DRIVERS EDUCATION INSTRUCTION

<u>Shawn Oleson, DBA Preferred Driver Education</u> entering into an agreement with <u>School District of Wisconsin Rapids</u> (<u>District</u>) on July 1, 2018 to provide Driver Education Instruction services to be held at Lincoln High School, 1801 16th Street South, Wisconsin Rapids, WI, for the <u>2018-19 School Year</u>. <u>Preferred Driver Education</u> shall facilitate driver education services for students enrolled in the <u>District</u> and the <u>District</u> will provide access to school facilities to <u>Preferred Driver Education</u>. <u>Preferred Driver Education</u> is considered an Independent Contractor and shall assume all responsibility for their actions with respect to the delivery of driver education services. During Driver Education Instruction, students are in the care, custody and control of the provider and the <u>District</u> will not be liable.

<u>Preferred Driver Education</u> shall provide classroom and behind-the-wheel driver education services that comply with all applicable laws and regulations. Classroom instruction shall occur during and/or outside the regular school day. Upon parent permission, students will be allowed to have classroom and behind-the-wheel instruction during scheduled study halls.

<u>Preferred Driver Education</u> agrees to:

- 1. Maintain vehicles in a safe and responsible manner that complies in all respects with applicable laws and regulations.
- 2. Name the <u>School District of Wisconsin Rapids (District)</u> as an Additional Insured on their Liability Insurance Policy maintaining combined coverages of not less than \$5,000,000.00, for General Liability, Automobile Liability, Umbrella as well as, Workers Compensation and Employers' Liability.
- 3. Maintain all materials, supplies, and equipment required to deliver services.
- 4. Maintain phone and other contact number(s) independent and separate from the <u>District</u>.
- 5. Be responsible for collecting all fees from students. When necessary, <u>Preferred Driver Education</u> will establish a payment schedule that assists students and/or their families who are not able to make a complete one-time payment.
- 6. Offer programming during the school year and during the summer months to meet student needs.
- 7. Operate classroom portions of the program during and after the school day in accordance with all <u>District</u> policies and building rules to accommodate student need. Classes held during the school day will be scheduled in accordance with the school calendar, and class periods will coincide with the building bell schedule and students assigned study hall.
- 8. Provide classroom instruction that must include the legislatively required topics listed below, in addition to the other topics and content that is covered.
 - Provide at least 30 clock hours of instruction; and must extend over at least three weeks if in summer and six weeks if during the school year.
 - Acquaint each student with the hazards posed by farm machinery and animals on highways and provide instruction in safely dealing with such hazards.
 - Provide at least 30 minutes of instruction relating to organ and tissue donation and organ and tissue donation procedures.
 - Provide at least 30 minutes of instruction on motorcycle awareness, as approved by a recognized motorcycle safety and awareness organization, and pedestrian and bicycle awareness, as approved by a recognized pedestrian and bicycle safety and awareness organization.
 - Include instruction relating to passing stopped emergency vehicles, tow trucks, and highway machinery equipment.
 - Acquaint each student with the hazards posed by railroad highway grade crossings and provide at least 30 minutes of instruction in safely dealing with these hazards.
 - Acquaint each student with the hazards posed by composing or sending electronic text messages or electronic mail messages while driving and with the provisions of s. 346.89(3).

- 9. Offer the behind-the-wheel portion of the program to students at a time that is not more than two months prior to the students' scheduled driving test. On street driving must:
 - Provide six hours of driving time
 - No student shall spend more than one hour per day in actual on-street driving
 - Lessons must extend over at least three weeks, regardless if in summer or during school year
 - All driver education on-street driving must be in a dual controlled vehicle and have a instructor in the right front passenger seat
- 10. Account for and regularly report the attendance of students enrolled in the Driver's Education program.
- 11. Communicate regularly with parents through a variety of means (i.e., informational meetings, flyers, correspondence home, e-mail) to build an understanding of the program and related requirements.
- 12. Be aware of, follow, and promote all school rules.
- 13. Require all personnel having contact with students, to undergo a <u>School District of Wisconsin Rapids (District)</u> background check.
- 14. Report any incident involving an instructor to the high school principal, as soon as possible, but not more than three (3) calendar days following any incidents involving moral turpitude, misdemeanors and felonies, as well as all traffic violations.

<u>Shawn Oleson DBA Preferred Driver Education</u> agrees to defend, indemnify, and hold harmless <u>School District of</u> <u>Wisconsin Rapids (District)</u>, its school board, administration, employees and volunteers, individually and collectively, from and against all costs, losses, claims, actions, attorney fees, and judgments arising from personal injuries, property damage, or otherwise, that may arise from or alleged to be caused by <u>Preferred Driver Education's</u> negligence as a result of <u>Preferred Driver Education</u> services, products, or use of <u>District's</u> land, facilities, or equipment. <u>Preferred Driver Education</u> agrees to provide a certificate of insurance for liability coverages satisfactory to the <u>District</u> and will name the <u>District</u> as an additional insured on said liability policy and provide a physical copy of the additional insured endorsement to the <u>District's</u> representative.

The <u>District</u> further agrees to provide a certificate of insurance for liability coverages satisfactory to the <u>Preferred Driver Education</u>.

WISCONSIN RAPIDS PUBLIC SCHOOLS

Resolution No. 20180115A Resolution in Support of the Wisconsin Voucher Taxpayer Transparency Bill (Assembly Bill 267 and Senate Bill 183)

WHEREAS, the School District of Wisconsin Rapids (WRPS) Board, administrators, educators, staff, parents, and community members are united in our effort to provide all children with the highest quality educational opportunities possible; and

WHEREAS, the School District of Wisconsin Rapids supports local control and the ability of the elected School Board to make decisions to support the learning of our students; and

WHEREAS, private school voucher advocates have consistently pushed for expanding the use of taxpayer-funded vouchers to pay tuition for students in private schools in Wisconsin; and

WHEREAS, the Governor and members of the Wisconsin Legislature have proposed expanding voucher programs into many more communities and have proposed increasing state payments to voucher schools; and

WHEREAS, a memo from the nonpartisan Legislative Fiscal Bureau demonstrated that payments to voucher schools under the Governor's proposed budget would range from \$7,757 to \$8,403 per student by 2018. Including all of Governor Walker's proposed increases, in some cases public schools might receive as much as \$1,700 less per student at \$6,703; and

WHEREAS, the same memo also shows that tax dollars for voucher operators are increasing 12 times faster than total public school aids and that voucher payments would more than double over eight years. At the same time, net general aids that support public schools and reduce property taxes would fall by 1.3%; and

WHEREAS, the voucher amount is \$7,323 for pupils in grades K-8 and \$7,969 for pupils in grades 9-12; and

WHEREAS, Assembly Bill 267 and Senate Bill 183, the "Wisconsin Voucher Taxpayer Transparency Bill," authored by state Representative Dana Wachs (D-Eau Claire) would require property tax bills to include information from the school district where the property is located regarding the amount of any net reduction in state aid, if any, to the district as a result of pupils enrolled in the statewide voucher program, the Racine voucher program, or the Milwaukee voucher program; and

WHEREAS, the increase in statewide property taxes due to school boards levying to offset lost aid due to the voucher system was over \$25 million in 2016-17. The statewide property tax impact is estimated to grow to \$37 million in 2017-18, and to \$47 million in 2018-19; and

WHEREAS, the School District of Wisconsin Rapids was required to levy \$333,258 in taxpayer dollars to be allocated to the statewide voucher program in 2017-18, and local taxpayers are not provided with information about their tax dollars being spent on private and voucher schools. When private school voucher programs expand in our community, WRPS loses state aid (to the voucher schools) and our School Board must raise additional

property taxes to replace the aid lost to the voucher schools or lose that funding permanently under the stateimposed revenue limits; and

WHEREAS, just as property tax bills show how much money goes to public schools and technical colleges, taxpayers deserve to know the cost of expanding the voucher program; and

WHEREAS, it bears repeating that voucher schools are not bound by most state instructional requirements or graduation standards, are not subject to either the state's accountability system (i.e., no school report cards are issued for voucher schools), are not held to the public accountability requirements contained in major federal laws, including special education, are not governed by locally elected school board members who must stand for election or reelection, do not have to accept all students, nor do they have to provide students with the same due process protections in public schools, do not have to employ teachers who have a background in the subjects they teach, and do not have to adhere to open meetings and public records laws; and

WHEREAS, the voters of Wisconsin have never had an opportunity to vote on whether or not Wisconsin should have a taxpayer-supported voucher program; and

FURTHER, multiple studies throughout the nation have shown that school voucher programs do not perform better in reading and math than students in public schools, and the nonpartisan Wisconsin Legislative Audit Bureau released a five-year longitudinal study in 2011 which concluded that students in Milwaukee using vouchers to attend private schools perform no better on standardized tests than their counterparts in public schools.

THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED that the WRPS Board of Education calls on Governor Walker, the Wisconsin State Assembly, and the Wisconsin Senate to support the Wisconsin Voucher Taxpayer Transparency Bill in an effort to be open, honest, and transparent with the taxpayers of the School District of Wisconsin Rapids and Wisconsin.
