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III. Actionable Items

A. Reading Recovery Consortium 66.30 Cooperative Agreement

Reading Recovery was started as an intensive reading intervention for first grade students in Wisconsin Rapids Public Schools (WRPS) over 20 years ago. Because of the program's success with students, as well as an outstanding professional development component for teachers, the program has continued in the District. Reading Recovery is now one of several interventions offered to first grade students who are not meeting grade level benchmarks through Response to Intervention (RtI).

Through the years of providing Reading Recovery, Wisconsin Rapids Public Schools (WRPS) has provided the Reading Recovery Teacher Leader for a consortium of school districts. Districts that were a part of the WRPS Reading Recovery Consortium would enter into a 66.30 Cooperative Agreement with us. Since Jackie Heinz's retirement at the end of the 2014-15 school year, Jackie has come back to work part time as the teacher leader for the WRPS school district, and we have not been a part of a consortium.

This year, Black River Falls has requested to enter into a 66.30 Cooperative Agreement with WRPS, requesting that two teachers receive services from Jackie, reforming the Central Wisconsin Reading Recovery Consortium. To that end, Jackie would provide services as set out in Attachment A, and WRPS would receive \$5,200 for her services. This funding would be used to defray the ongoing cost of providing Reading Recovery. Attachment B sets out the proposed 66.30 Cooperative Agreement with Black River Falls School District.

The administration recommends approval of the 66.30 Cooperative Agreement between Black River Falls and Wisconsin Rapids Public Schools for participation in the Central Wisconsin Reading Recovery Consortium.

### B. Grants

### 1. DPI Mini-Grant: Cool to be Kind

The Department of Public Instruction (DPI) provides \$1000 mini-grants to support innovative statewide prevention and wellness programs. Mary Schulz, Counselor at Lincoln High School (LHS), along with students in the LHS Random Acts of Kindness Group, authored and received a grant entitled "Cool to Be Kind." This grant will enable LHS students to give anti-bullying presentations at all District schools, provide recognition for staff and students at Lincoln, and support the Rise to Remember Event on May 19, 2019.

The administration recommends approval of the DPI mini-grant entitled Cool to Be Kind for Lincoln High School in the amount of \$1000.

### 2. ACT Now! Staff Training Grant

The ACT Now! Staff Training Grant from Children's Hospital of Wisconsin, in partnership with the Department of Public Instruction, supports recipient schools' efforts to participate in online bullying prevention courses and resources to reduce the impact of bullying in school communities.

Penny Antell, Principal and Michelle Waldvogel, Counselor at Mead Elementary Charter School, wrote and received this grant for \$1500 for Mead School. Penny will be present to explain the grant.

The administration recommends approval of the ACT Now! Staff Training Grant for Mead Elementary Charter School in the amount of \$1,500.

### IV. Updates

### A. Mead Elementary Charter School Report

Penny Antell, Principal at Mead Elementary Charter School, will be present to update the committee on the Charter School goals for 2018-19 and accomplishments from 2017-18.

### B. Mead Elementary Charter School Outdoor Classroom Report

Melissa Miller, Reading and Math Interventionist at THINK Elementary School, and coordinator of the Mead Elementary Charter School Outdoor Classroom, will be present to update the committee on the progress made on this project. The project was first introduced to the Board in September of 2015.

### C. Update and Discussion on District Athletic Facilities

You may recall a brief conversation regarding our working with local baseball and softball organizations around developing a Legacy Foundation application to help fund the costs of the renovation/installation of updated softball and baseball diamonds at Lincoln High School (LHS). We will provide an update on where we are in the process as well as discuss the possibility of expanding the scope of our approach to include possible renovations (Attachment C) to nearly all exterior athletic facilities at LHS.

### D. School and District Report Cards: 2017-18

Kathi Stebbins-Hintz, Director of Curriculum and Instruction will be present to discuss results of the 2017-18 School and District Report Cards. Attachment D sets out the front page of the WRPS District Report Card. Attachment E sets out results from each school and surrounding schools for 2017-18, and comparisons to prior school years.

### E. Home Stays: Lincoln High School (LHS) French Program

Justine Horvath, WRPS French Teacher, is working to develop a three week home stay program for students from France with students enrolled in French at Lincoln High School. The program is coordinated through Language and Friendships, Inc. The purpose of the home stay is to develop global citizens, create cultural awareness, immerse students in the language they are studying, and develop global friendships. Students from France would attend some classes with their host student at Lincoln High School, as well as participate in tours and activities to expose them to American life. The program would begin this year with only two to three students, and increase in number based on the success of the experience.

### 2018-19 Reading Recovery Proposed Consortium Costs

### **Black River Falls School District**

Costs are based on two teachers from Black River Falls School District participating in Reading Recovery.

### COSTS INCLUDE:

- Four three-hour continuing contact sessions held in Wisconsin Rapids and Black River Falls.
- One 3.5 hour meeting held in Wisconsin Rapids at the beginning of the school year.
- One 3.5 hour meeting held in Wisconsin Rapids at the end of the school year.
- One 2.5 hour clinical visit per teacher at their site.
- Professional development materials and supplies.

### INDIVIDUAL TEACHER VISIT

Individual teacher visits from teacher leader include one ninety-minute visit for each teacher.

Minimum of one zoom observation.

### SITE VISITS

District visits from teacher leader: One at the beginning of the school year and one at the end of the school year.

Districts may request additional teacher leader visit per number of teachers participating in Reading Recovery from the district, per school year. An additional visit is to be a maximum of two hours in length, and will incur additional costs of travel time, contact time and mileage.

READING RECOVERY CONSORTIUM COST: \$5,200 MILEAGE COSTS TO BE PAID BY BLACK RIVER FALLS SCHOOL DISTRICT.

### Central Wisconsin Reading Recovery Consortium 2018-2019 66.30 Cooperative Agreement

WHEREAS, the School Districts of <u>Black River Falls</u> and <u>Wisconsin Rapids</u> desire to share in the costs and personnel necessary to create and implement a Reading Recovery Program for their respective school districts; and

WHEREAS, such Reading Recovery Program will require a commitment of personnel and resources from all school districts; and

WHEREAS, the parties desire through this agreement to enter into an intergovernmental agreement pursuant to Sec. 66.30, Wis. Stats;

NOW, THEREFORE, the participating school districts, by signature of their authorized representatives, do hereby agree as follows:

Section 1-Background

In order to establish the framework and common understandings of the parties to this agreement, the parties have agreed that the following constitutes the background within which they are entering this agreement.

- 1. The parties desire to provide a Reading Recovery Program for their respective school districts.
- The Reading Recovery Program is a one-to-one, early intervention reading program for the least capable readers in first grade. It is a program tailored to supplement the reading program in the classroom including such methods as:
  - reading shorter stories to build confidence;
  - daily writing,
  - re-reading of students' favorite books;
  - learning to hear sounds in words by writing simple stories; and
  - providing for individually tailored thirty (30) minute reading sessions for participating students.
- 3. The Reading Recovery Program necessitates the parties sharing in financial commitments to train and educate personnel regarding the concept's creation, implementation, and maintenance of the program.

### Section 2-Teacher/Leader

- 1. The teacher/leader shall have completed all required training to deliver the Reading Recovery Program.
- 2. The teacher/leader shall implement, administer and evaluate the Reading Recovery Program.
- 3. The teacher/leader shall teach one class per week during the academic school year for teachers of each school district that participates in the <u>Teacher Training Program</u>. Such program training shall educate and train a selected number of staff to teach and implement the Reading Recovery Program in their respective districts.
- 4. The teacher/leader shall provide <u>Continuing Contact</u> training support for teachers in each school district that has completed the Teacher Training Program and has requested to participate.

### Section 3-Financial Commitments/Personnel

Each participating school district agrees:

- 1. The Wisconsin Rapids Public Schools shall act as fiscal agent and shall bill each participating school district each school year for one hundred percent (100%) of all costs specified by this section. Each school district shall pay Wisconsin Rapids Public Schools within thirty (30) days of the date of the invoice.
- 2. Under the term of this agreement each teacher/leader shall be deemed an employee of the Wisconsin Rapids Public Schools for all purposes including compliance with teacher retirement, workers compensation, unemployment compensation, social security, taxation and sec. 111.70, Wis. Stats.
- 3. To share all costs with regard to the teacher/leader compensation (salary and employee benefits) and the costs of education, training, transportation and pre-approved expenses based upon the budget set forth in Exhibit 1 attached hereto and made part hereof.

### **Section 4-Duration**

The term of this agreement shall be for the 2018-19 school year commencing on <u>JULY 1, 2018</u>, and ending on <u>JUNE 30, 2019</u>, unless extended by written amendment to this Agreement.

### Section 5-Severability

Should a court of competent jurisdiction hold any section, paragraph, phrase, or other provision of this agreement invalid, the remaining provisions of this agreement shall continue to be valid.

### Section 6-Entire Agreement

This agreement constitutes the entire agreement between the parties. There exists no other agreement, oral or written, between the parties not contained in this agreement.

# THE FUTURE OF LINCOLN ATHLETICS


