IV. Updates

A. Cursive Writing Expectations in Wisconsin Rapids Public Schools (WRPS)

Discussion is currently taking place in the Wisconsin Legislature regarding an instructional standard for cursive writing. Jennifer Wilhorn, Assistant Director of Curriculum and Instruction will be present to update the Committee on handwriting instruction in WRPS.

All WRPS elementary students (K-5) participate in approximately 30 to 60 minutes of handwriting instruction each week depending upon their grade level. Students begin learning cursive during the latter half of second grade. Instruction in cursive continues through fifth grade. Elementary classroom teachers are provided a resource binder to guide their instruction. Student materials are provided to each individual student for practice.

B. Student Travel

- 1. Approximately 28 Lincoln High School girls softball players (varsity and JV) will be traveling by bus to Nashville, TN March 23 through March 25, 2020. The teams will play two games and participate in a scrimmage, enabling them to practice outside before weather conditions allow it in Wisconsin. Isaac Holberg, Varsity Coach, along with three other softball coaches, their wives, and one female district employee will be chaperoning the trip.
- 2. Approximately 30 WRPS orchestra students will have the opportunity to attend the Dorian Orchestra Festival at Luther College in Decorah, Iowa February 9 through February 10, 2020. The orchestra will be traveling by bus. Ginger Marten will be chaperoning the trip along with one additional chaperone.
- C. School and District Report Cards: 2018-19

Kathi Stebbins-Hintz, Director of Curriculum and Instruction will be present to discuss results of the 2018-19 School and District Report Cards. Attachment E sets out the front page of the WRPS District Report Card. Attachment F sets out results from each school and surrounding schools for 2018-19, and comparisons to prior school years.

330 CURRICULUM DEVELOPMENT

The school district shall provide for a learning program <u>curriculum that is</u> based on developed objectives covering <u>standards and that identifies</u> skills, knowledge, and values <u>resources and best instructional practices</u>. The learning program <u>curriculum</u> shall be <u>subject to</u> measure <u>dement as a means for assessing the validity of adopted goals and the performance of the schools in meeting those goals <u>via student success on state assessments</u>, <u>local screeners</u>, <u>and classroom assessments</u>.</u>

The District's curriculum shall be in harmony with the Board's adopted Mission Statement, <u>strategic planning</u> goals, <u>state</u> academic standards, and state law. Curriculum development by the professional staff shall be guided by such factors as:

- 1. actual studies and information concerning the needs of district students,
- 2. the range of abilities, aptitudes and interests of district students,
- 3. aspirations of residents of the school district for district students, and
- 4. the mobility of the population, making it necessary to provide education for district students that <u>move</u> <u>between district schools and</u> would be useful anywhere in the country or in the world.

The Board desires that unnecessary duplication of work among the various school levels be eliminated, and that courses of study and syllabi curriculum be coordinated effectively among the various schools.

An eight (8) <u>ten (10)</u> year <u>procedure process</u> for instructional improvement has been developed by the curriculum department <u>and will be overseen by the Council for Instructional Improvement (CII)</u>. This eight (8) <u>ten (10)</u> year <u>procedure process</u> guides curriculum development within the district.

The Board is responsible for approving the school district curriculum and delegates <u>responsibility for its</u> <u>development</u> to the professional staff. the responsibility for development of necessary procedures. The Board favors providing opportunities for staff to help in curriculum development through <u>opportunities</u> such devices as workshops, study groups, assistance from outside consultants, and an extended school year to allow teachers to devote summertime to the effort. Teachers shall teach within the approved curricula.

331 CURRICULUM GUIDES MAPS

Instructional goals and objectives and course outlines <u>Curriculum maps</u> shall be prepared by the professional staff consistent with <u>the District's Council for Instructional Improvement (CII) process and with</u> state law, the Mission Statement of the School District, <u>the Strategic Plan</u> Board goals and objectives and approved academic standards. Where possible, a student will be taught at his/her level of need and will not repeat that which he/she already knows.

The Superintendent, and through him/her, the curriculum and instruction program staff, and building administration, shall have general coordinating authority and supervision over the formation of all <u>curriculum maps</u> eourses of study and instructional objectives.

334 CURRICULUM EVALUATION

In order to continue to offer district students the highest quality education opportunities and to assure the community that the school district is being operated efficiently and effectively, the administration and staff will implement a <u>engage in a</u> comprehensive curriculum <u>and instruction</u> renewal process according to the long-range evaluation plan approved by the Board <u>and overseen by the Council for Instructional Improvement (CII)</u>.

The overall goals of this process are to:

- 1. Maintain state of the art knowledge <u>and implementation</u> of best practices found in program literature and research and determine relevance for the district;
- 2. Update or revise curriculum documents <u>maps</u> that already exist;
- 3. Provide opportunities for staff to collaboratively work on common goals and learning targets *outcomes and* assessments for students; and
- 4. Provide decision making information for <u>Acquire</u> resources acquisition that best support the curriculum and needs of students.

ATTACHMENT D DRAFT – First Reading ESC Meeting – 12/2/19

442.1 STUDENT BOARD REPRESENTATIVES

A member of the junior or senior class shall be elected annually to serve as student representative to the Board, in accordance with established guidelines.

- 1. A student representative to the Board will be a member of the junior or senior class, elected at large by the student body.
- 2. The student representative's term shall be for one year, commencing on July 1 of the year of election September 1 following the spring election. One additional successive term may be served by the same student.
- The student representative shall be notified of all full Board and committee meetings, which are not executive sessions.
- 4. The student representative shall receive all information normally sent to Board members, except items dealing with the personnel matters or items of a highly confidential nature.
- 5. The student representative shall sit at the Board table and participate in all appropriate discussion and debate, providing the insights and the feelings of the student body to the members of the Board.
- 6. The student representative shall not be permitted to vote on any issue.
