

Open to any student, our group meets twice a month before school and one RPT per month (and as needed for special projects). We are a unique high school club, and members have many opportunities for volunteering. As a result, members have excellent experiences to reference in resumes and applications. One of our main projects includes welcoming new students--providing welcome bags, giving first-day tours, and hosting one New Student Meet & Greet each trimester during RPT to connect with new students and exchange students. We conduct service projects to promote kindness and build awareness about issues such as bullying, teen dating violence, and mental health--as well as fundraise and write grants to complete a larger impact project each year, such as "flipping" a room at The Family Center and installing a "Breather Bench" around a tree in front of LHS. Through outreach, we help jumpstart kindness clubs at local elementary schools. Toward the end of the year, we work with counselors and community resources to host a Mental Health Resource Fair and bring student performers and artists together for our "Rise to Remember" variety show event. LHS Live Stream Team

The LHS LiveStream Team is active in many areas of media production. The team oversees the RapidsTV.org website, manages the Live Stream Broadcast Studio and Control Room, operates the Daktronics Video displays at South Wood County Stadium and LHS Fieldhouse, and broadcasts live stream events for Lincoln High School and the Wisconsin Rapids School District. Team members have opportunities to record live events, work on graphic designs and overlays for broadcast, operate and control audio/visual (A/V) equipment for both broadcast and the South Wood County Stadium video board, and provide commentary for sporting events. Link Crew

Leadership Development

This two-day curriculum, delivered by "Link Crew" trained educators, will immerse students in activities designed to build leadership skills that will benefit them in high school and beyond. Specifically, students will be trained in team-building activities, cooperative skill development, and effective discussion strategies. Link Crew Orientation

This course is for all freshmen and will take place on August 22, 2024, from 8:00 – 11:30 a.m. Link Crew is designed to link freshmen with successful upperclassmen with the intention of creating a positive and cohesive school culture. By implementing energetic and purposefully designed activities, students will experience a curriculum rich in team and individual skill development. Math League

The Math League is composed of students who are interested in mathematical competitions. There are three meets in Stevens Point, but for students to go, they must qualify on pre-tests that LHS math teachers give. Those who score the highest on these pre-tests will qualify to take part in the regional tests at UWSP. Anyone who participated in at least one of the three meets will receive an award. Mock Trial

Mock trial is an extracurricular activity where students perform the role of an attorney or witness in a hypothetical court case. Students prepare the case from both the plaintiff's and the defense's perspectives. The mock trial team competes in the regional tournament at a courthouse in February against other mock trial teams from Central Wisconsin and can even earn a trip to state in March. Teams range from six to 12 people. Mock trial provides students with a great experience with the law, especially in the courtroom setting. In addition to learning about the law, students will also improve their critical thinking, speaking, and performance skills. The season starts in October with weekly after-school meetings. Music Department

The Lincoln Music Department has a host of co-curricular groups that meet outside the school day and give dozens of performances at school and throughout the community. These include a Mariachi Band, Fiddle Squad, Chamber Players, Acapella Choir, Chamber Singers/Vocal Jazz, Men's Choir, Pep Band, Marching Band, Drumline, Jazz Ensemble, and Pit Orchestra. National Art Honor Society

The National Art Honor Society is a co-curricular organization that grows out of the visual arts department. It is designed for students who are seriously interested in the arts. The organization participates in statewide competitions, is involved with a variety of artistic school service projects, and engages in an active program outside of the boundaries of the art classroom. National Honor Society

The National Honor Society is an organization for juniors and seniors that recognizes students who have excelled in academics, service, leadership, and character. The athletic program, as well as many other school co-curricular organizations, is governed by the Wisconsin Public School's "District Co-Curricular Code of Conduct." Academic eligibility, regulations related to the use of alcohol and drugs, conduct expectations, in addition to the state-wide regulations applicable to athletics, are a part of this code. Participating students and their parents are expected to carefully review and adhere to the contents of the code. Questions regarding the Activities Code can be made to the Athletic Director, or members of the administrative team, at any time.

As you can tell by the previous listing of clubs and activities, a healthy and challenging series of opportunities are available to all students. Involvement in activities provides an opportunity for students to learn the value of hard work, as well as the benefit of self-discipline.

Virtually every examination of student success tells us that an active and involved student is more successful during his/her high school years, as well as during the rest of their lives. All students are encouraged to get involved with these activities.

Many of the activities in the previous listing are governed by the Wisconsin Rapids Public School's "Co-Curricular Code of Conduct."
