ACP-Why does it matter?

Academic & Career Planning (ACP) is meant to serve as a student-driven, adult-supported process providing opportunities for students to engage in activities and explore resources to help cultivate unique information-based visions for post-secondary success. Our students have access to many opportunities. Talk with your student to see if they are interested in youth apprenticeship, job shadowing, job search assistance, volunteering, and/or the teen leadership program. Interested? Contact Ms. King to get more information. The ACP Center is open every day during regular school hours. Interested in something not on the list? Stop by, email, or call the ACP Center. Remember, ACP is taking the time now to help save time and money later. Take advantage of the resources here at Lincoln!



The Job Fair is happening April 2nd from 2:00–5:00 with special access for teens only from 2:00–3:00! It is open to ANY area teen 14-18 years old looking for part-time, full-time, or seasonal employment. Teens should pre-register here in order to be entered into the prize drawing. The general public is welcome to join from 3:00–5:00 and they do not need to pre-register.

College Visit: We are heading to Western Technical College and UW La Crosse on Thursday, April 11th. We will be leaving at 7:15 and returning at approximately 4:15. Any interested sophomore or junior can stop by the ACP Center to pick up a permission slip. Permission slips are due Thursday, April 10th.

Volunteer Hours: Volunteering allows students to develop, enhance, and refine skills, network, and gain access to diverse opportunities to help them learn more about our community. Volunteering helps youth explore skills and identify interests that can help them as they navigate through their academic and career planning. Any student who completes 100 volunteer hours, or more, by the spring of their senior year will receive special recognition at graduation. No academic credit is given. Volunteering is a wonderful way to gain experience to include on a job application or resume and can also help with scholarship applications. ASVAB at LHS: The Armed Services Vocational Aptitude Battery (ASVAB) is a heavily researched and well-respected aptitude test developed by the Department of Defense. The ASVAB measures aptitude and acquired skills, which can be used to help predict future academic and occupational success. ASVAB scores thus give students insight into their options and aid them in planning their next step after high school. For any student interested in the military, it is used to determine qualification for enlistment in the United States Armed Forces. Taking the test does not mean students have to enlist in the military. Lincoln High School is hosting the ASVAB exam on Friday, April 11, 2025, from 11:00-2:00. 
Increasing Student Participation at LHS Events

Lincoln HS Honors Breakfast

LHS will be carrying on the Honors Breakfast tradition this year. It will be the 7th annual breakfast for Honors students at LHS. Students who have earned a 3.5 GPA or higher for the first two trimesters of the 2024–25 School Year will be recognized. This recognition will take place in the west side of the fieldhouse. The doors will open at 6:30 AM, the program will begin at 6:45 AM, and it will conclude at 7:15 AM. Students who qualify will receive a letter in the mail letting families know which date to attend. Prom 2025

Our Prom is open to all students in grades 9-12. It will be on Saturday, May 10th, from 8:00 PM to midnight. The ticket price will be \$20 per person. Here are the expectations:

- Semi-formal attire is a minimum dress requirement. Examples are a tuxedo, suit, or dinner jacket. Dresses need to reach the knee at a minimum. Slits in dresses may not extend above mid-thigh. No excessive midriff exposure is allowed.
- Guests are allowed if they are at least in high school or under 21 years old. Guests must be registered through the form sent out by Officer Olivares by April 18th.
- LHS students must show their student IDs to get in. Guests must have an official photo ID.

Students will know our expectations before the event. Please reinforce these at home so everyone is on the same page and the students can have a positive, fun experience. The Grand March will be at 9:30 PM with doors opening at 9:00 PM. Doors lock when March begins. The Grand March will include the Junior Prom Court and Royalty, junior couples, and anyone accompanying a junior. The entrance fee for this is \$5 per spectator.

Direct Admit Wisconsin

The universities of Wisconsin are some of the best in the country, and now students can gain admittance to them in a simpler, less expensive manner!

The Direct Admit Wisconsin program, which began in 2024, allows high school seniors in Wisconsin to be automatically admitted to participating WI universities. Students who meet the GPA and academic course rank criteria and are graduating from a participating WI high school are admitted to the schools below without having to submit or pay for any application. LHS was part of the pilot for this and is again participating in the program!

All students who are on track for graduation and have, or are about to have, 4 credits of English, 3 credits of approved math, 3 credits of social studies, 3 credits of science, and 4 additional academic credits will receive an admission offer through Direct Admit.

We will be making this a component of the registration process for incoming juniors. For now, parents should opt in for Direct Admit through the Family Access portal in Skyward. This should be done by June 3, 2025.
