The district reserves the right to cancel courses that do not have sufficient numbers of students enrolled or where certified teachers cannot be contracted.

ATTENDANCE

ATTENDANCE - Due to the already condensed nature of summer school courses, daily attendance is critically important. *As a result, students are expected to attend all classes. Students who exceed 3 absences will be dropped from their course(s).* While 3 days are allowed for emergencies or circumstances beyond the student's control, they are not intended for appointments or family vacations. No distinction is made between whether an absence is excused or unexcused. Regardless of reason, no more than 3 absences will be allowed. Please note that the Lincoln High School Attendance Line is not activated or maintained during summer school. GENERAL INFORMATION

NON-RESIDENT TUITION - Students who do not reside in the Wisconsin Rapids School District are welcome to attend Summer School. The tuition will be \$175.00 per class. The Wisconsin Rapids School District reserves the right to make all final decisions regarding the acceptance of non-resident students.

REGISTRATION - Registration is ongoing at all District secondary schools (public and parochial). Please contact your school counselor if you are concerned that you may need to retake a class. Students are asked to register with their counselor by Tuesday, June 4.

WHERE - LHS Summer School classes will be held at Lincoln High School. Enter through the Main Entrance.

WHEN - Thursday, June 6 - Friday, July 11 (Monday through Friday) - 8:00 a.m. - 9:50 a.m. and 10:00 a.m. - 11:50 a.m. for recovery courses. There will be no class on Thursday, July 4 and Friday, July 5.

DRESS AND CONDUCT - Students are expected to follow LHS dress code and conduct policies.

BUSSING - Bus transportation will be provided for those students that ride the bus during the regular school year. Please place a ✓ in the appropriate area on the registration form for bussing preference.

BIKE RIDERS - Students who ride their bicycles to school are expected to park and lock their bicycles in the designated bike racks.

BREAKFAST - Students will receive a free breakfast served in the Commons.

CANCELLATION - Summer School Program classes will not be held if enrollments are insufficient for the operation of a given program or if qualified staff cannot be hired. The District reserves the right to cancel a course. In these situations, the registration fee will be refunded.

CHROMEBOOK PICK-UP - Students will pick up their Chromebook on the first day in class.

COMPUTER BASED CREDIT RECOVERY GUIDELINES

- Students must attend in-building class during the assigned class time.
- Students must complete all units of the computer based course through the Edgenuity program.
- The same general attendance rules will apply.
- Courses will not be extended beyond the summer school end date.
- Students may not end summer school early unless approved by administration to receive credit for course.

Credit recovery students should be progressing a minimum of 4% in each course per day. A student who is not at the 12% completion mark after the third day will be moved into a teacher-led summer school course and removed from the credit recovery course. Students in credit recovery who are not making adequate progress during in building seat time may be marked tardy, therefore counting towards a student's overall absence total.



RECOVERY COURSES

ENGLISH

0100 English I A

8:00-9:50

This program provides instruction in the areas of literature, writing, speaking, and listening. This course will count for one-half (.5) credit for students who did not earn credit in English I during the regular school year.

0101 English I B

10:00-11:50

This program provides instruction in the areas of literature, writing, speaking, and listening. This course will count for one-half (.5) credit for students who did not earn credit in English I during the regular school year.

0102 English II A

8:00-9:50

Literature will be the focus for reading, writing, listening, and speaking activities in this course. This course will count for one-half (.5) credit for students in grades 10-12 who did not earn credit in English II during the regular school year.

0103 English II B

10:00-11:50

Literature will be the focus for reading, writing, listening, and speaking activities in this course. This course will count for one-half (.5) credit for students in grades 10-12 who did not earn credit in English II during the regular school year.

0104 English III

8:00-9:50

This course will focus on reading, writing, speaking and listening skills. This course will count for one-half (.5) credit for students who did not earn credit in English III during the regular school year.

0105 Reading & Writing in the Summer

10:00-11:50

This course is designed to improve reading and writing skills, regardless of the student's ability. It is intended to help students who have average or below average abilities in these areas. However, any student who is truly interested in improving his or her reading and writing talent is encouraged to take this course. Activities will include independent reading, lots of "one on one" instruction, and writing exercises. Depending on the age, grade level, and individual situation, this course can be taken for enrichment or credit.

English Computer-Based Credit Recovery

8:00-9:50

10:00-11:50

This computer-based credit recovery program will be limited to students who score between 45-59% in the appropriate English course. All work will be completed in the building through our Edgenuity online portal. A student may be able to remediate .5 to 1 credit in the summer. Registering for this class does not guarantee enrollment. Enrollment will be based upon counselor recommendations. If not selected, the student will be placed in an appropriate course listed above. RECOVERY COURSES

MATHEMATICS

0405 Algebra I A - 0406 Algebra I B 8:00-9:50 10:00-11:50

Algebra I, the first course in the four-year traditional high school math program, is devoted to the study of high school level algebra. The student will learn and apply algebra skills and concepts to solve many different types of problems using functions, equations, tables, and graphs as algebraic models. Throughout the course, the student will investigate connections to geometry, statistics, and probability. Students who successfully complete this course will earn one-half (.5) credit for the course they failed to receive credit for during the regular school year.

0407 Geometry A - 0408 Geometry B 8:00-9:50

Geometry, the second course in the four-year traditional high school math program, is devoted to the study of high school level geometry. This course emphasizes reasoning and logical thinking and balances coordinate and plane geometry with transformational geometry and solid geometry. The student also will study and practice the concept of proof in several forms. The student will connect geometry to algebra, data analysis, and trigonometry. Students who successfully complete this course will earn one-half (.5) credit for the course they failed to receive credit in during the regular school year.

0409 Algebra II A - 0410 Algebra II B 10:00-11:50

Algebra II, the third course in the four-year traditional high school math program, is devoted to the study of advanced high school algebra topics. The student will learn about linear, quadratic, exponential, polynomial, rational, and logarithmic functions; data systems, recursion equations; analytic geometry; discrete mathematics; trigonometry; and probability. *This is a fast-paced course for those who intend to continue their education after high school.* Students who successfully complete this course will earn one-half (.5) credit for the course they failed to receive credit in during the regular school year.

Mathematics Computer-Based Credit Recovery 8:00-9:50 10:00-11:50

This computer-based credit recovery program will be limited to students who score between 45-59% in the appropriate math course. All work will be completed in the building through our Edgenuity online portal. A student may be able to remediate .5 to 1 credit in the summer. Registering for this class does not guarantee enrollment. Enrollment will be based upon counselor recommendations. If not selected, the student will be placed in an appropriate course. SCIENCE

0300 Lab Methods in Physics and Chemistry 8:00-9:50

Students will use common research methods from Physics and Chemistry to investigate motion, energy, chemical reactions, and nuclear reactions. Students who complete this course successfully will earn one-half (.5) credit toward graduation. This course is open to students who failed a science class during the school year.

0301 Lab Methods in Biology and Geoscience 10:00-11:50

Students will use common research methods from Biology and Earth Science disciplines to investigate biomolecules, local plant and animal species, earth-sun relationships, local topography, weather patterns, and geologic history. Students who complete this course successfully will earn one-half (.5) credit toward graduation. This course is open to students who failed a science class during the school year.

Science Computer-Based Credit Recovery 8:00-9:50 10:00-11:50

This computer-based credit recovery program will be limited to students who score between 45-59% in the appropriate science course. All work will be completed in the building through our Edgenuity online portal. A student may be able to remediate .5 to 1 credit in the summer. Registering for this class does not guarantee enrollment. Enrollment will be based upon counselor recommendations. If not selected, the student will be placed in an appropriate course. SOCIAL STUDIES

0207 Human Geography A

8:00-9:50

Human Geography A will explore the unique environments in which people around the world live and how those environments shape an individual group's way of life. After investigating topics, such as world population, resource availability, folk and popular culture, world religion, and race and ethnic constructs, students will have a broad understanding of the forces shaping our current world. In Human Geography B, students will explore the development of countries and forces shaping countries today. After investigating topics, such as political organization, the global community, global economic development, and land use and food production, students will have a broad understanding of the forces shaping our current world. Additionally, there will be a special emphasis on the development of social studies disciplinary skills; students will have ample opportunity to complete inquiry projects, take positions and propose solutions to modern issues, and participate in debates and simulations. This course will count for one-half (.5) credit for students who did not earn credit in Human Geography A during the regular school year.

0208 Human Geography B

10:00-11:50

This course will explore the development of countries and forces shaping countries today. After investigating topics, such as political organization, the global community, global economic development, and land use and food production, students will have a broad understanding of the forces shaping our current world. Additionally, there will be a special emphasis on the development of social studies disciplinary skills; students will have ample opportunity to complete inquiry projects, take positions and propose solutions to modern issues, and participate in debates and simulations. This course will count for one-half (.5) credit for students who did not earn credit in Human Geography B during the regular school year.

0203 American History A 1900-1945

8:00-9:50

These courses will give the student an overall view of the American experience from 1900-1945. It will focus on the social, political, economic, and cultural past. This course will count for one-half (.5) credit for students who did not earn credit during the regular school year.

0204 American History B 1945-present

10:00-11:50

These courses will give the student an overall view of the American experience from 1945 to the present. It will focus on the social, political, economic, and cultural past. This course will count for one-half (.5) credit for students who did not earn credit during the regular school year.

Social Studies Computer-Based Credit Recovery 8:00-9:50 10:00-11:50

This computer-based credit recovery program will be limited to students who score between 45-59% in the appropriate Social Studies course. All work will be completed in the building through our Edgenuity online portal. A student may be able to remediate .5 to 1 credit in the summer. Registering for this class does not guarantee enrollment. Enrollment will be based upon counselor recommendations. If not selected, the student will be placed in an appropriate course listed above. Secondary Elective Course Offering

0879 STRENGTH CONDITIONING AND FITNESS / .5 Elective Credit

This course is for current 9th - 11th grade students. Current 8th grade students will need approval from Mr. Biolo or a current LHS head coach. The course will emphasize the general principles of fitness. Students will be given the opportunity to improve their general physical preparedness (GPP) by working within the 10 Physical Skills: cardiovascular, stamina, strength, flexibility, power, speed, coordination, agility, balance, and accuracy. Students will also be exposed to sport-specific preparation (SPP) by creating individualized strength programs. Daily attendance is mandatory. There will also be out of class work in canvas.

Link Crew

0802 Leadership Development

Time 8:00 a.m. - 12:00 p.m.

This course will be offered on 8/14/24 and 8/15/24 for 4 hours each day. Throughout this two-day curriculum delivered by "Link Crew" trained educators, students will be immersed in activities designed to build leadership skills which will benefit them in high school and beyond. Specifically, students will be trained in team building activities, cooperative skill development and effective discussion strategies. This is open to all juniors and seniors in the 2024-25 school year who are eager to increase their capacity as leaders, motivators, role models, and teachers.

0803 Link Crew Orientation

Time 8:00 a.m. - 12:00 p.m.

This course is required for all freshmen and will take place on 8/22/24 from 8:00 a.m. - 12:00 p.m. Link Crew is designed to link freshmen with successful upperclassmen with the intention of creating a positive and cohesive school culture. Through the implementation of energetic and purposefully designed activities, students will experience a curriculum rich in team and individual skill development. Students will leave this course more prepared to have a successful high school experience while obtaining skills which promote post-secondary college and career readiness.

Volunteer Program (Non-Credit)

The LHS Volunteer Program is a non-credit opportunity for students to get involved in their community by volunteering. Students who accumulate 100 hours of service will receive special recognition during the regular school year and at graduation. Registration is open to all students entering grades 9, 10, 11, or 12 during the 2024-2025 school year. SUMMER SCHOOL MISSION STATEMENT—It is the policy of the Wisconsin Rapids Public Schools to provide appropriate instruction during the summer at both the elementary and secondary level. Summer School should be an integral part of the total school program offering a balance of courses which may be academic, enriching, recovery, and applicable to the special needs of the pupils residing in the Wisconsin Rapids attendance area. Registration shall be open to all pupils, however, entrance requirements (such as grade levels) may be imposed for some classes and attendance in others may be required for some pupils (students seeking secondary credit.) Classes will be offered to allow pupils to gain necessary credits for graduation or take courses not available to them during the regular school year. The Summer School Program will be reviewed annually and classes added or dropped depending on the needs of the pupils residing in the District.
