## Childhood Immunizations (ages 0-18)

We provide routine childhood vaccines through the Vaccine for Children (VFC) program. Children are eligible to receive vaccines at our health department if they meet one of the following:

- · No health insurance
- Enrolled in or eligible for Medicaid
- Health insurance doesn't cover vaccines
- American Indian or Alaska Native

### Adult Immunizations (ages 19+)

Select vaccines available to those who meet certain eligibility requirements. Fees vary. We do not carry travel vaccines, adult influenza, RSV or the shingles vaccine.


A parent or legal guardian MUST accompany children under the age of 18. If parent or guardian is unable to accompany the child to the clinic, they should contact the Health Department prior to clinic time for arrangements to complete and sign the consent forms.

# Vaccines Available at Wood County Health Department Immunization Clinics

Hib (Haemophilus influenza b)

Provides protection against Haemophilus influenza type b illness and meningitis.

DTaP (Diphtheria, Tetanus & Acellular Pertussis), Tdap (Tetanus, Diphtheria, and Pertussis), and Td (Tetanus, Diphtheria)

Provides protection against diphtheria, tetanus, and pertussis (whooping cough).

IPV (Inactivated Polio Vaccine) Provides protection against polio.

MCV4 (Meningococcal Conjugate Vaccine) and MenB (Meningococcal B) Decreases risk for meningococcal disease.

MMR (Measles, Mumps, and Rubella)
Protects against measles, mumps and rubella.

Hep A (Hepatitis A)
Provides protection against Hepatitis A.

Hep B (Hepatitis B)

Provides protection against Hepatitis B.

Varicella (Chickenpox)
Provides protection against chicken pox.

PCV (Pneumococcal Conjugate Vaccine) and PPSV (Pneumococcal Polysaccharide Vaccine) Reduces risk pneumococcal disease which can cause meningitis, blood infections, and some types of ear infections.

**HPV** (Human Papillomavirus)

Can prevent cervical, vaginal & vulvar cancer in females and genital warts, anal cancers, and mouth, throat, head and neck cancers in both females and males.

**Rotavirus** 

Oral vaccine to prevent rotavirus that causes severe diarrhea in babies. Given to infants 6-32 weeks of age.

Influenza

Reduces risk of influenza virus.

**COVID-19 Vaccines** 

Protects against serious illness from COVID-19

#### Recommended Immunization Schedule

Wood County Health Department follows the CDC's recommended childhood vaccine schedule.

2 months:	DTaP, Hib, IPV, Hep B, PCV, Rotavirus
4 months:	DTaP, Hib, IPV, Hep B (if 1st dose given at 2 mo.), PCV, Rotavirus
6 months:	DTaP, (must be 6 months between 3 <sup>rd</sup> & 4 <sup>th</sup> doses), PCV, Rotavirus
6-18 months:	IPV, Hep B
12 months:	Hib, MMR, PCV, Varicella, Hep A
15-18 months:	DTaP, Hep A (must be 6 mo. between 1 <sup>st</sup> & 2 <sup>nd</sup> doses)
4-6 years:	DTaP, IPV, MMR, Varicella Hep B series (if not received previously)
11-12 years:	HPV (2-3 doses), MCV (2 <sup>nd</sup> dose at 16yo), MenB (between 16-18 yo), TdaP (booster every 10 yr)

#### **Prevention of Seasonal Respiratory Infections**

Influenza	Everyone 6 months and older.*
vaccine	Follow up with an annual booster.
COVID-19	Everyone 6 months and older.
vaccine	Number of doses depends on
	age, previous vaccine and dose.
RSV	-One dose for all infants younger
antibody	than 8 months of age.**
	-One dose for infants/babies
	8-19 months of age at increased
	risk for severe RSV disease.**
RSV	Pregnant individuals at 32-36

#### **Immunization Law**

State law requires that all public and private school and child care students present written evidence of immunizations against certain diseases within 30 days of enrollment. Waivers are permitted for reasons of health, religion, or personal conviction.

#### **ENTRANCE TO K-12**

#### K through 6th grades:

- 4 doses of polio vaccine
- 3 doses of Hep B
- 4 doses of DTaP/DTP/DT/Td
- 2 doses of Varicella (chickenpox)
- 2 doses of MMR

#### 7th through 11th grades:

- All previously listed vaccines
- And Tdap

#### **ENTRANCE TO CHILD CARE**

#### 5 months through 15 months:

- 2 doses of DTP/DTaP/DT; 2 doses of IPV;
- 2 doses of Hep B; 2 doses of Hib;
- 2 doses of PCV

#### 16 months through 23 months:

- 3 doses of DTP/DTaP/DT; 2 doses of IPV:
- 2 doses of Hep B; 3 doses of Hib;
- 3 doses of PCV; 1 dose of MMR

#### 2 years through 4 years:

- 4 dose of DTP/DTaP/DT; 3 doses of IPV;
- 3 doses of Hep B; 3 doses of Hib;
- 3 doses of PCV; 1 dose of MMR;
- 1 dose of Varicella
